Explain briefly what is weight, force, and density and the relationship $\mathbf{Q}\mathbf{1}$ (a) between these properties based on their SI units. (6 marks)

 - Malaysia is among a county with high obesity people. (i)
 - Perodua Axia boot volume size is larger than Perodua Myvi. (ii)
 - A balloon can explode if its pressed too hard. (iii)

- A chemical laboratory is paying RM 0.12/kWh for its electricity rate. To (d) reduce its electricity bill, its owner install a solar panel with a rated power of 20 kW. If the solar panel operates 2200 hours per year, determine;
 - The yearly amount of electric power generated by the solar panel. (i)
 - The money saved by the laboratory per year. (ii)

Describe the molecular and energy changes that takes place when water, (b) initially as an ice cube (solid), converts into liquid water and finally turned into steam (gas). (6 marks)

- State whether the statements below is correct or not. If the statement is not (c) correct, suggest the correct answer.
 - The temperature of boiling water is 100°C at 1 atm. If it is cooled (i) at constant pressure into 80°C, it is called compressed liquid.
 - If water vapor is heated at constant 1 atm until its temperature (ii) exceed 200°C, this phase is called saturated liquid-vapor mixture.
 - Water can change phase from liquid to vapor via expansion at (iii) contant pressure of 1 atm.

A sealed tank contain 50 kg of water at 85°C. If one third of the water is in liquid form and the rest is in vapor form, determine the volume and (d) pressure of the tank. (5 marks)

- State the forms of internal energy associated with the statements below. Q3(a)
 - At molecular level, electrons contain energy to rotate freely around (i) the nucleus of an atom.
 - When liquid water is sufficiently heated until energy added to the (ii) water molecules can overcome the attractive forces between them, it will turn into gas.
 - Uncontrolled fission of uranium in atomic bomb release a huge (iii) amount of energy.

- Write a thermodynamics situations based on each energy balance (b) equations below:
 - $\Delta E = \Delta PE + Q + W.$ (i)
 - $\Delta E = Q$. (ii)
 - $\Delta E = \Delta KE$. (iii)
 - $\Delta E = \Delta U + Q$. (iv) (8 marks)
- An engineer increase a water pump pressure from 15 psia to 70 (i) psia. The outlet pipe of this water pump is directly connected into a (c) storage tank located 10 meter higher. Determine the power input required (in hp) to pump 0.02 m³/s of water taking into account that water density is 1000 kg/m³. (6 marks)
 - Water is being heated in a closed pan while being stirred by a paddle wheel. During the heating process, 40 kJ of heat is (ii) transferred to the water, while 6 kJ of heat is lost to the surrounding air. The paddle-wheel does 500 N.m work to the water. Write the energy balance equation thus determine the final energy of the system, given that its initial energy is 10 kJ. (5 marks)

State all variable and constant parameters for isothermal, isobaric (i) 04 (a) and polytropic process.

Explain why the boundary work, Wb for constant-volume process, (ii) in piston cylinder device is always zero.

Prove that $1 \text{ kPa.m}^3 = 1 \text{ kJ.}$ (iii)

- Write a the general energy balance equations (for closed system) based on (b) thermodynamic situations below.
 - A piston-cylinder device containing 10 kg of saturated vapor is (i) compressed isothermally into saturated liquid.
 - A piston-cylinder device containing liquid Nitrogen gas is heated (ii) at constant volume.

(4 marks)

A piston-cylinder device initially contain 0.07 m³ of nitrogen gas (i) (N₂) at 130 kPa and 120°C. The nitrogen is now expanded (c) poytropically to a state of 100 kPa and 100°C. Determine the boundary work, Wb for this process.

(5 marks)

A student living in a fixed 4 m \times 6 m \times 6m room, turned on her 150 Watt fan before she leaves her room on a hot morning, hoping (ii) that her room will be cooler when she retuned back in the evening. Assuming all the doors and windows are tightly closed and neglecting heat transfer from the room to its surrounding, determine the temperature of the room when she comes back 8 hours later. Use specific heat values at room temperatures, given that the room is at 100 kPa and 28°C in the morning when she leaves.

- Air at 17 °C and 80 kPa enters the diffuser of a jet steadily with a velocity (d) of 200 m/s. The inlet area of the diffuser is 0.4 m². The air leaves the diffuser with a velocity that is very small (almost zero) compared to the inlet velocity. Determine:
 - The mass flow rate of the air. (i)

Explain why does a heat engine such as steam power plant (ii) operates in a cycle but a car engine (which is also a heat engine) is not.

Heat is transferred to a heat engine from a furnace at a rate of 80 (iii) MW. If the rate of waste heat rejection to a nearby river is 60 MW, determine the net power output and the thermal efficiency of this heat engine.

Based on the Gibbs function data and the calculated equilibrium constant, (c) K_p for the dissociation process of oxygen (O₂), prove why the preferred operating temperature for this process is 3727 °C, not 25 °C.
